Turabian Style Rules

Detailed description and examples for Turabian documentation for bibliographic entries can be found on pages 96-133 of *A Pocket Guide to Writing History*, 5th edition by Mary Lynn Rampolla. The bibliography must include all the works that you cited in your notes. List sources alphabetically by the last name of the authors.

1. The reference list is called a *Bibliography* and located at the end of the research paper.
2. The first line of the a bibliography entry is usually typed flush left and the following lines are indented. Individual entries should be single-spaced; double space between entries.
3. Author's name appears as given in the work, every important word of the title is capitalized.
4. Alphabetize entries by author's last name. If author's name is unknown, alphabetize by title.
5. The title of a book, magazine, journal, newspaper, or video/DVD should be italicized. Names of article should be placed in quotation marks.

AUTHORS

Reverse the author's name for alphabetizing, adding a comma after the last name and placing a period after the complete name. Give the author's name as it appears on the title page. If your bibliography includes more than one work by the same author, you should use three dashes (---) followed by a period in place of the author's name after the initial entry. If a source has more than one author, begin with the name of the first author, last name first, and give the names of the other authors in normal order. If a book has an author as well as an editor, the editor's name follows the title.

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Do not place a comma after the name of the journal; follow it with the volume number. Journals only use volume numbers unless pagination is NOT continuous, then it uses both volume and issue numbers. Journal dates are enclosed in parenthesis and followed by a colon. Ex. (March 2000): or (2000): Magazine and newspaper dates are open. Ex. March 22, 2000 Place a comma after the name of the newspaper, followed by the date.

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
